

FRESH WATER WATCH

Fighting for healthy freshwater habitats across the UK

Pollution, climate change and overexploitation have brought our fresh water systems to crisis point. Many rivers are no longer fit to swim in and our water supplies for drinking and growing food are threatened. Working together with local communities and partners, we have created a growing network of concerned local citizens who care about the health of their precious freshwater resources: FreshWater Watch. This involves training

community groups across the UK to use our FreshWater Watch toolkit to detect nutrient pollution and fight for real change. Only 14% of the UK's rivers are considered to be in good ecological health, and every single one of them fails to meet the required chemical standards.

The FreshWater Watch toolkit helps to uncover the secrets hidden underneath the surface and makes the invisible, visible. Our community groups turn into citizen scientists as they learn how to test a freshwater sample for nitrates, phosphates and turbidity. By submitting a simple survey, they can see their data mapped in realtime, with automatically generated feedback explaining what their results show. Not only is the toolkit easy to use, but it is accessible to everyone, regardless of their education or background. Many of our FreshWater Watch community group members in the UK come to us with no prior research experience or scientific qualifications, but that doesn't stop them from participating directly in citizen

LAVANT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

After a two-year break Farm Diary is back. Since we last wrote our circumstances have changed considerably. We are still farming at East Dean with our 240-cow organic dairy herd and flock of sheep. However, father and son team John and Harry are now also managing the Home Farm at Goodwood which has been an interesting and challenging journey over the last two years but has also provided Harry with a wonderful opportunity to hone his farm management skills. This diary will now cover both farms.

Home Farm, Goodwood, consists of around 3500 acres stretching from Westhampnett in the South to Charlton and Singleton in the North. The farm has been organic for many years and supports several livestock enterprises, all using native breeds as well cereal crops using traditional varieties. The hub of Home Farm with the 220 Dairy Shorthorn cows and farm shop is between The Goodwood hotel and Boxgrove. Much of the farm consists of downland pasture where Sussex beef cattle and Southdown sheep graze.

There is also a herd of outdoor Saddleback pigs which rotate around fields on the lower ground. Most of the meat from these enterprises finds its way into the various restaurants and cafes on the Goodwood Estate or sold through the Goodwood Organic Farm Shop. Milk is pasteurised at Home Farm, bottled and delivered round the estate and to numerous local outlets or used to make delicious artisan cheeses. Spring barley is grown successfully at Home Farm which is used to supplement the diets of the milking cows and fattening beef cattle and to provide malt for Goodwood's very popular and locally produced beers. Heritage wheat is now grown on contract which will be used to provide flour to make nutritious organic bread.

Here at East Dean, we are focussing on the winter routine work of milking and feeding the dairy herd and raising the youngstock. All our cattle are housed during the winter months which makes our work a little easier. The sheep of course are outside grazing what grass there is left before moving on to clear up the cover crops ahead of the start of the spring planting season. The rams (tups) have been with the ewes since Bonfire night and will be removed early in January. This month the ewes will be scanned to check they are pregnant, mark the few that are not pregnant to sell and indicate how many lambs each ewe is carrying. This will help us to manage their feed accordingly. Lambing will then start in early April.

While it has been yet another very wet start to the winter it's great that the flooding hasn't reached the village by the New Year and fingers crossed our newly repaired sewer system won't leak when the springs do eventually burst through the ground.

We have lots more news on both farms to share as the year progresses.



Speed Awareness - A 50mph Motorway?

So here's what happened: I was driving along the M62 into Liverpool, paying close attention to the SatNav since I'd not been there before and needed to know which exit to take. I was doing 60. Not 80 or 90 or proper caning it, just 60. On a motorway. Whoever heard of a motorway with a 50mph speed limit? Well I certainly hadn't until I got home five days later and the letter from the Merseyside Police was already waiting for me to tell me that they've got one and I'd been caught on it! 50! That's not a motorway, that's a cart track! Still, if you're thinking of re-locating, I suggest moving to Liverpool. There's clearly no real crime there, since the Scouse Rozzers have nothing better to do than persecute honest law abiding motorists.

And that is what I pointed out to the coordinators of the Speed Awareness Course I attended at Avisford Park Hotel. Now they could have said that it was clearly a mistake, a vile travesty of justice, given me my money back and twenty quid out of the petty cash for inconveniencing me. They could have, but they didn't. Instead myself and about 20 other miscreants were re-educated about the reasons for speed limits and common dangers to look out for on the roads and some of it was really quite interesting and not stuff I already knew. For instance; if you go at 80 instead of 70 for 10 miles, you actually arrive at your destination only one minute sooner! I used that as a question in last Sunday's quiz and one clever Herbert pointed out it's actually 64 seconds but whatever; although you feel that you're getting there much quicker you really aren't, or not by enough to make much difference. Another fact to make you think: the extra stopping distance of a vehicle going at 31 rather than 30mph is eight yards - quite enough to hit the back of a stationary car (or a child) rather than stopping just short of it. And no, they don't give you any leeway these days, perhaps actual policemen used to do that but cameras have no such "oh well, near enough" function built into their programme, which is why there will be a special furnace in Hell for the man who invented them.

Other points that nearly everyone got wrong; apparently a road is only classified as a dual carriageway (70mph) if it has a central reservation - merely having two lanes in each direction doesn't count, it's still only 60! Who knew? And the variable speed limit signs that light up on gantries over motorways are compulsory. I'd sort of assumed they were advisory, a bit like yellow lines and 'use by' dates on tins, but apparently not. Oh and so are the red crosses over lanes, they mean you're not allowed to drive in that lane, not it might be a bit tight in a while so mind how you

go. One sign none of us could ever recall seeing was 30 on a square blue background. That's a minimum speed limit, and there are some out there. No, me neither. Tim Weeks

Throughout December, Sussex Police took part in Operation Limit - the annual campaign that aims to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries caused by people driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.

Officers carried out increased patrols and set up random stop check sites along busy driving routes. More than 8,500 motorists were stopped and checked. Last year's campaign totalled around 6,000 checks so Sussex Police have been even more proactive. There were 270 arrests on Sussex roads and the majority of these were for drug-driving - more than 60 arrests were made following collisions.

Summary of the meeting of West Dean Parish Council held on 8th January 2025 at West Dean College...

<u>In attendance</u> Cllr Jeremy Hunt, West Sussex County Council, Clare Kennett, Clerk to the Parish Council, PCSO Colin Booker, and one member of the public.

Rural Crime PCSO Booker was kind enough to attend the meeting to give Council an update, for which many thanks. The Parish of West Dean has been hit particularly hard by rural crime over the last few years, mainly with hare coursing and poaching. He said that raising awareness of the issue and encouraging people to report issues, no matter how small, would help the police enormously. Councillors' Reports Reports from County Councillor Jeremy Hunt and District Councillor Henry Potter were well received and can be viewed on our website.

Planning There are no contentious planning issues at present, apart from the ongoing enforcement complaints at Binderton regarding the renting out of the Pool House as a holiday home.

VE Day It was agreed that a commemoration of VE Day, perhaps with beacon, would be organised, and a sum was allocated accordingly in the budget. Further news to follow. The remembrance silhouettes will be installed at the Cemetery once tree and hedge maintenance has been carried out, and before the VE Day 80 commemorations.

Selsey Arms Work is ongoing to register the Selsey Arms as an Asset of Community Value

Website development and email accounts It was agreed that the Council will prepare a new website in line with local government guidance, and members' email addresses will be changed for better security. Full details will be published when all is up and running.

Finance The Parish Council finances are all in good order. The draft budget for the coming financial year was discussed and agreed, with an increase in the precept to help the Council deliver services to the Parish. This entails an increase for a Council Tax Bank D property of £8.23 per year or £1.52 per month compared to the previous year.

even manage this in a single turn - just like a 147 break in snooker.

Rural Crime

At the last meeting of West Dean Parish Council on 8th January 2025, PCSO Colin Booker was kind enough to attend and speak about Rural Crime. He works in a specialised and unique area of policing which focuses on rural areas only, dealing with agricultural, environmental, heritage and wildlife crime, as well as tackling issues such as fly tipping.

The Parish of West Dean has been hit particularly hard by rural crime over the last few years, mainly with hare coursing and poaching. This is seasonal and tends to happen between August and February each year. It is often combined with aggressive and abusive behaviour. Hare coursing and deer stalking are commonly to do with the betting industry and sometimes filmed for an online audience.

Many crimes and confrontations happen at night in the dark which are scary as there is no automatic right to protect property. Landowners must be very careful as any threat could result in them losing their firearm licence. If a crime is in progress, just call 999. If a crime has taken place, call 101 or report it at www.sussex.police.uk

Raise awareness Encouraging people to report issues, no matter how small, is the best way to help the police. This builds up a picture of crime in the area, and reporting incidents gives residents a reference number which can be used as evidence if issues continue. Local farmers should report first to the police, then post the reference number on the WhatsApp group that has been set up with the rural crime team as a means of sharing information. Apply to PCSO Booker for more information about this.


Vehicles There are many uninsured and untaxed vehicles, or those with a police marker, using rural roads without cameras to avoid detection. Five people have been arrested in East Dean recently and, although they received a small fine, they now have a criminal record and will get bigger sentences for any repeat offence. Rural crime has a far-reaching impact, as claiming on insurance means higher premiums and, in the case of storage businesses, people are less likely to use them again. The solution is not just claiming on insurance, which is often the response from the police, but preventing incidents in the first place so that businesses are protected.

The good news Communication works both ways. PCSO Booker will be providing details of the most recent rural crime incidents for members to note at future Council meetings so that we are aware of issues and these can be more widely circulated.

More good news Just in recent weeks [23rd January] a vehicle was seized in the Chilgrove area. This followed earlier sightings, and a report from East Dean followed by police action within the hour. Local reports and police backup in the right place at the right time. Well done everyone!
